Delaware River wins 2025 River of the Year!

The Delaware River has been selected as Pennsylvania's River of the Year, and we are ready to celebrate! The Delaware has a remarkable history in our nation's development, stemming back to the native Lenape's early settlements along the fertile riverbanks. Its picturesque panoramas and natural resources continue to support and inspire river communities along its way. This special free-flowing river provides high-quality habitat for a diversity of wildlife and drinking water for millions of humans!

Monroe County Conservation District is diligently preparing for the upcoming *Delaware River of the Year Festival* on Wednesday, June 18th from 2-8pm at Minisink Park in Delaware Water Gap. In partnership with the Delaware River Sojourn, we successfully received a \$15,000 grant to bring this exciting event to our local community. The festival will celebrate the Delaware River and highlight its vital role in our ecosystem and daily lives. Attendees can look forward to a variety of activities, including live music,

educational presentations, talks by state representatives, and merchandise from Monroe County vendors.

We are also planning to feature local food and beverage trucks, enhancing the festival experience for all.



As part of the festival preparations, we are hosting a **Poster Contest** for high school students in the area. The winner will have their design featured as the *official festival poster* and will receive a \$250 scholarship. Please spread the word, and take a moment to appreciate our local protected river! Signs of Spring are appearing all around us at Kettle Creek, and there's maybe no sweeter sign for environmental education staff than the first significant sap collection of the 2025 Maple Sugaring Season!

Have you ever wondered why we start to tap our trees in the Meesing Sugarbush in February? Sap flows most in late Winter and early Spring when temperatures alternate between freezing and thawing. These changing weather conditions and the tree's physiology lead to a difference in pressure between the inside and outside of the tree. The pressure difference pushes sap out through the tap holes we place in the tree, resulting in the dripping sap that we collect, cook, and turn into delicious syrup!

If you joined us at one of our recent Maple Sugaring public days, you know that we're still hard at work collecting, cooking, and bottling syrup from the 250 trees we tap each year. If you couldn't make it to our public days, don't worry! Check out our list of upcoming Public Programming to see how you can join us again soon.

Although we're still renovating our main entrance, our building remains open to visitors, and our trails are open to the public year-round, from sunrise to sunset. Stay awhile and you might notice some promising signs of Spring—you might see some familiar birds returning from their winter homes, hear a group of excited students on a field trip, or feel a warmer breeze as Winter ends.

We hope to see you at a program, visiting our building, or out on our trails this Spring! ♦

Project FeederWatch Update



We've had some exciting updates with our Project FeederWatch program! As of now, we've recorded a total of 24 species at our center. The variety of birds that have visited our feeders reflects the diverse bird population in the area, and it's always a treat to spot new species. Some of the most popular sightings recently have included the Black-capped Chickadee, Tufted Titmouse, and Dark-eyed Juncos. These familiar and lively visitors have been loving our feeders, providing plenty of opportunities for birdwatchers to enjoy and observe.

Project FeederWatch is a citizen science initiative that encourages individuals to monitor the birds that visit their feeders throughout the winter months. Participants collect valuable data that is submitted to the Cornell Lab of Ornithology. This information helps scientists track bird distribution and abundance, contributing to vital research on the health and movement of bird populations. This program is also a wonderful opportunity for novice birders to gain experience. Working alongside seasoned birdwatchers, beginners can improve their bird identification skills, learn to spot different species, and deepen their understanding of bird behavior.

A note about Avian Influenza: Avian influenza, commonly known as "bird flu," is caused by an influenza type A virus. While it occurs naturally in wild birds, especially waterfowl, songbirds are much less likely to contract variants of avian influenza and are less likely to shed large amounts of the virus, meaning they do not transmit the disease easily. Avian influenza typically does not affect bird species that frequent backyard bird feeders, such as the songbirds we see at our center. It's important to note that the avian influenza primarily affects waterfowl, raptors, and corvids (like crows, ravens), and the risk to songbirds is very low. While it's always a good idea to practice good hygiene when handling bird feeders, there's no need for excessive concern regarding songbird health.





The Pennsylvania Invasive Replacement Program is a new initiative that will give homeowners and others the option to remove invasive trees and shrubs from their property and replace them with native trees.

The Pennsylvania Department of Conservation and Natural Resources is joined by several partner organizations to provide landowners and homeowners with up to five (5) FREE, healthy, young, native tree species to replace invasive trees and shrubs removed from their property, starting in May of this year. Kettle Creek's Winter Eagle Watches-AKA "Raptor Rambles"

We hosted two mid-winter bus trips to seek and behold the glory of our majestic National Bird! Winter is a perfect time for eagle watching; since many of our local water bodies freeze over, eagles congregate at moving water areas like the Delaware and Lackawaxen Rivers to do their fishing. This time of year is also when eagle courtship behaviors can be seen—like chasing each other through the skies and potentially locking talons and cartwheeling towards the ground! Although bald eagles mate for life, even old couples will engage in this thrilling courtship spectacle in order to strengthen their trust and pair bond to ultimately become a better parenting team.

In addition to eagles, we also spotted over a dozen red-tailed hawks plus Coopers, Sharp-shinned, Broad-winged, and Red-Shouldered Hawks. Other cool species of note were a Merlin and some elegant mute swans in the river.

The 44th Annual Christmas Bird Count Results

On Sunday December 15, 2024, seventeen dedicated volunteers took to the fields and forests, scanned the rivers, streams, lakes and ponds in search of birds. It was the day of the 44th annual **Pocono Mountain Christmas Bird Count**. The CBC is the oldest citizen scientist project in the world. It began with famed ornithologist Frank Chapman, founder of Bird Lore (which would become Audubon) magazine in December of 1900. The Pocono Mountain Chapter of the National Audubon Society began the Pocono Mountain CBC in December of 1980. Although the Pocono Mountain Chapter of Audubon folded several years ago the Christmas Bird Count continues.

This year the volunteers found 2,995 individual birds of 60 different species. Some of the species are found in large numbers: 211 Canada geese, 143 Tufted titmice, 684 dark-eyed juncos. Others are not so conspicuous but with so many eyes searching they are found: 2 American tree sparrows, 1 White-crowned sparrow and 1 pine siskin. And then there are those that still surprise even ardent birders like 78 Eastern bluebirds and 14 Bald eagles. Even though we know they are around, the numbers still surprise us, bluebirds because, well, it's winter, and the bald eagle because it was not

that long ago when they stood on the brink of extinction.

We would like to thank all of the volunteers that continue to make the CBC the oldest citizen science project on Earth. The 2025 CBC will be held on Sunday, December 14. Please consider joining us in keeping this historic effort alive. ◆

For the past 50 years, what was once a novel brainchild of MCCD along with Monroe County Sportsmen's clubs has blossomed into our longest-running program and a very special week we are *so proud* to host every year.

Conservation Camp is a unique and authentic experience which has exposed over 1200 teenagers to the outdoor world and all its resources. We strive to create a positive and encouraging camp environment where every camper can participate in numerous outdoor activities while being a part of an intimate group of 30 teenagers plus staff. What also makes Conservation Camp so special and immersive is that we **do not allow cell phones** for the camp-

mersive is that we **do not allow cell phones** for the campers, in order to inspire more open communication and interaction with fellow campers, staff, and environmental professionals.

Past campers have commented on being a bit apprehensive when first arriving at camp but by the end of the week they considered it *one of the best experiences ever*. Over that one week period, we see campers learn about the outdoors, socialize and support each other, push beyond their comfort zones and truly enjoy being in the present moment together. In other words, they learn what is truly important in an otherwise sedentary, technology-laden, and dopamine-addicted modern lifestyle.




Most importantly, they learn why all of the above MAT-TERS—why we explore, adventure, meet new people, try new experiences, and why we protect the places where all of that just falls into place—our natural environment. And in between all of that, our teenage campers learn a little bit more about themselves along the way.

Camp activities include programs on natural history, wildlife management, water quality, archery, trap shooting, a high adventure ropes course and a 2-day canoe camping trip on the Delaware River. Each activity is led by professionals in the field and is designed to be both informative and enjoyable. The camp is held at Stony Acres, an East Stroudsburg University facility near Marshall's Creek. The cost for the entire week is \$200 and it includes everything. We also have scholarships available for qualified campers. Our 50th Conservation Camp will be held Saturday, July 19th - 26th and applications are on our website at www.mcconservation.com. 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Conserving Natural Resources for Our Future

Avian Flu Update

According to the PA Game Commission Avian Flu is a common viral disease of birds that can infect humans and other mammals. The viruses are classified on the severity of the illness they cause in poultry and most are not considered a public health threat. The virus is shed through all excretions (saliva, feces) and is highly contagious among birds. While the "bird flu" is typically observed in waterfowl and some birds of prey, our community needs to be diligent in keeping our songbird and domestic birds protected.

The PA Game Commission recommends the following: Exercise good hygiene when maintaining bird feeders and baths to prevent the spread of disease. Every couple of weeks, feeders and baths should be emptied, washed with soapy water, rinsed, then a 10% household bleach solution should be applied to disinfect them before refilling (either allow a 10-minute contact time before rinsing or allow to air dry). Any spilled seed should also be cleaned up to mitigate disease spread.

Besides the impacts to our wild avian populations, increases in viral outbreaks on farms and egg production operations are seeing an exponential increase in the costs associated with keeping their birds safe and healthy and reducing the risk of Avian



flu to consumers. This is why you might see the skyrocketing of prices of eggs and products made with eggs at your local grocery store.

While there is currently no known cure for the Avian flu, scientists are working diligently with farmers to combat its reach and reduce the risks to human health and safety. As is always the case, stay educated and stay informed. If you have any questions regarding Avian Influenza, please contact the PA Game Commission for wild birds and the US Department of Agriculture for domestic birds.
